During our stay at the Voices of the Future experience, we were able to interact with several leaders and entrepreneurs that attended the summit at Vietnam.

It was a very challenging experience to make the interviews. First of all, we had little or no background about the people we were interviewing, so we had to start off from scratch by introducing ourselves and asking them for a brief account of their career and current position. We found it amazing that there were people from many different places (and not exclusively from APEC member economies). We found people from the Netherlands, China, Singapore, Mexico and other different economies walking through the same hallway.

The approach was also a difficult part of the interview. We had to pick from sight those who looked open and willing to talk. We had some trouble in this part, due to the fact that many of the businessmen were on a rush or going to some other appointment. Nevertheless, we always found someone willing to give us two minutes to sit down and talk for us.



Amongst the entrepreneurs we interviewed, we spoke to people like **Dr. Paul E. Jacobs**, CEO and Chairman of the Board of Qualcomm, a very important enterprise in the area of communications and Wireless Internet Service. We asked him questions such as his point of view about the summit being held in Vietnam, and his expectations on moving into the Southeast Asia market of global communications.

Another person we met was Mr. Juan Autrique, he is the Chairman and CEO of Grupo

Industrial Mexicano S.A. de C.V. which is a very important company in Mexico that produces products made from steel. We had dinner with him and he told us that the key to success is education, so that if we want to become very successful persons we need to study a lot and constantly update our knowledge because if not we will be left behind in this globalized world. He is a very wise man, full of experience and we were very glad that he decided to spend some of his time with us.





We also met Mr. Ary Kahan, he is the 2006 Senior International Fellow in the Center on Philanthropy and Civil Society in New York. He is a Mexican that is trying to export Mexican tacos to Asian Countries. He was also very nice to us, as well as Mr. Autrique. He taught us that no matter what religion, race, or gender we are the key to always to succeed in life and business is respect. He also



told us that we must always rely in our family and that we need to think in everyone else's wellbeing to become successful leaders.

Another person we interviewed was Mr. Do Xuan Quang, who is the Managing Director of Vector Aviation, the leading company specializing in the Aviation Industry from General Sales Agents, charter broker, cargo consultancy, aircraft leasing, oversized, dangerous and express cargo, cargo services, ticketing to IT distribution. He told us that Vietnam's economy is growing very fast, and that a country, in order to grow and develop, needs to open the doors to foreign investment.
